Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia are a terrible scourge inflicted on millions of people around the world. The majority of those afflicted, but not all, are in their "senior" years. It may take some time to advance to the point where symptoms begin to become noticeable. Memory lapses beyond the common ones that accompany birthdays state to increase, followed by behavioural changes and cognitive decline. Eventually the ability to perform basic functions such as bathing, continence, feeding oneself and ultimately communicating with those around them, including their loved ones are inevitable mileposts on the sad and frightening journey that is dementia. Temperament changes that are totally foreign to any past history throughout their life can severely augment stress on loved ones and family caregivers

In an organization such as our Gyro club where the membership's age has advanced steadily over the years, it is no surprise that a number of our members are all too familiar with what I just described. Sadly a number of us have already lost our spouses or close friends and relatives to this disease or we are in the midst of witnessing one of the stages right now.

As most of you know, I am personally approaching the point where my daughter and I can no longer care for my wife Calli and will have to turn her over to a group of trained professionals. We are exhausted and she needs more help that we can give her now. I anticipate that when that day arrives we will be

overcome with a sense of relief and extreme sadness.

I am writing this today because I learned that one of my close cousins, who has been battling dementia for a decade, finally got relief and passed away. My sister is in the late stages of the same battle. I am struck by sadness and decided to put down my emotions on paper to share with a group of friends. If you are personally familiar with what this dreadful disease entails as it progresses to its inevitable conclusion, you have my deepest empathy. If you are lucky enough to have avoided the experience, I hope that continues.

I have found comfort in a concept noted by an American physician who wrote a book titled "Evolution Angel". The thought that stuck with me was that witnessing dementia was like watching the patient slowly moving out of their home one room at a time. I have found comfort in that image.


For those of you who knew him, Jim Copeland passed along news that Al Clark, a long time member of the Calgary club, had passed away after a long battle with cancer on September 29th.


LAST EVENT: BOCCE NIGHT October 4th

"We have no way to get clean water. The local mining operation has poisoned the water our people have been drinking for thousands of years. We've been flying bottled water in, and it's terribly expensive."


Once again, Prime Minister Trudeau dials a number, yells into the phone for a few minutes, and then hangs up.
