EDITOR'S RANT

It's a brand-new Year, filled with potential. So much of it and how it affects us personally will depend on what we make it. If we allow ourselves, our thoughts and our perspectives to be governed by the mainstream media and the world's political forces, we will likely spend much of the year in terror and depression. But there is so much more to our world that often doesn't reach us because those in power find it harder to control the people when we are optimistic, feeling blessed and glad to be alive.

With the exception of token "feel good" pieces at the end of news casts, we are hard pressed to find much cause for optimism by listening to or reading the news we have been used to having provide us with a view of the "real world". Decades ago, the tabloids used to hang on the credo, "If it bleeds, it leads". Sensationalism and negative, sometimes even hurtful stories sold papers. Today that mindset has infected to varying degrees almost all publicly consumed media. The advent of technological advances, from computers, to the internet, to Artificial Intelligence have made major changes to the game. There are, of course, a few exceptions to this huge generalization but most of us have never heard of them.

I am determined to have a go at developing and nurturing a more positive outlook as we start the new year. Obviously, this is far too broad a topic to explore in one rant so this will be an ongoing exploration. Our sources for potential perceptual

changes might be roughly divided into geographic categories: huge global, human species types of issues; regional/local issues; personal/friends and family issues.

While global issues rarely can be significantly influenced by those of us who consider ourselves mere mortals, we can have a greater impact on our lives and perceptions the smaller and more immediate our perceived sphere of influence becomes. The further we zoom in to more local and personal stories, the better our chances are of maintaining joy and a healthy attitude toward life. Maybe the effort to seek out and become more aware of positive and encouraging perspectives worth sharing from our larger world will in some small way support the dissemination of more a balanced outlook that serves the greater good.

Let's start with a few examples of items I ran across this week that might fall into the positive global/species news category.

- * Malaria has a history of killing over 100,000,000 people, mostly children. Apparently, a new vaccine has just come available last month that could save the next 100,000,000 of our global citizens.
- * While acknowledging the flaws in much our current attempts at climate control, the world's use of solar and wind energy sources rose 58% in 2023 and doubled over the last 18 months. Time will tell if it has any true positive influence on our planet but so far it offers a positive hint.
- * Deforestation in the Amazon dropped 53% this past year since the election of Brazil's new leader who has a different view for the future of the country and the world.

There are so many things that can be cause for viewing our lives with more optimism. I plan to touch on more of those, especially at the local and personal levels in future rants. I came across a comment yesterday that seemed to summarize what I am leading up to in my quest for positivity. *Optimism doesn't need to be simply a reaction to things you see around you. It can be a choice by which you navigate the world around you. It is up to us to choose the positive or the negative.* Could 2024 be the year when we start choosing the positive?

Historic Edmonton

The JOHNSTONE WALKER Department store closed in 1974. It was demolished in 1979. The site is now a small park.



North West Mounted Police with cannons at the sports grounds in the river flats, Edmonton, Alberta. Edmonton Public School is on the hill; brewery in Rossdale is on right. The cannons were used in the Northwest Rebellion of 1885. Cannons are 9 pdr rifled muzzle loading with caissons. One is at Fort Edmonton Park presently, one is at Fort Battleford Historical Park, and one is at the Parade Square, RCMP Museum in Regina.






High tech street light maintenance 1900's







