Taking a break from "normal" life may be productive as long as it is temporary. Too many my age take a permanent break and just drift away. That is far from my intent. I am thoroughly enjoying my writing—books, bulletins and putting thoughts to paper. I enjoy visiting with old friends (and young ones, too). My physical activity is admittedly less vigorous than my planned routine, but one has to have some inconsistency in one's life to avoid monotony.

I tried availing myself of a wheelchair at the airport when I returned from my 2 weeks at home ending at the Gyro 50th Anniversary, due to my COPD. It was a huge relief as we skipped lines and long walks to the faraway gates. I had never been in a wheelchair before. I hope to restrict such rides to airports for some time yet.

As I sit here at my desk in my little "guest house" cabin, I feel comfortable with my thoughts. I purposely placed the desk so that it doesn't face the lake to avoid distractions as I write. I turned it to face a mountain slope a few feet away with large rocks and scattered foliage. Unfortunately, I continue to be distracted by a half dozen squirrels who chase each other, constantly, "chirping" like an NHL hockey player. I am very pleased that my office and sleeping accommodation are all under one roof. The main cottage is about 20 steps and has a solid growth of Oak trees above it. At this time of year, day and night, the acorns drop on that roof. The acoustic volume of their impact is distracting. Then, as a breeze picks up for a few minutes, we get the impression that we are being assaulted by gangs using machine guns. We are tempted to dive for cover. These assaults can last for over a minute at a time. Talking during these attacks is impossible. Such is the life on Fitch Bay in the Fall.

So there you have it - a close up and personal view into the exciting life I have chosen for the past few months.

Next month the bulletin will include some politics. It remains a part of who we were and who we are.

Of course, it wouldn't be called a "rant" if it didn't include some note of unease or dissatisfaction.
